Activity #3: What deserves a rubric?

Use rubrics for **complete** processes, performances and products that are common **outside of school**. These include debates, oral presentations, and posters.

Use checklists for **partial** products, skills, and knowledge items that are used primarily in **classrooms**. These include sentences and answers to short essay questions. You can also use them to support rubrics by helping students "check" the different rubric requirements as they complete them.

Use single or multiple point systems for items that can **only** be right or wrong, such as computation problems.
